BEGINNING THE JOURNEY... OPPORTUNITIES DURING LENT





SYNOD MESSAGE FROM FR. JIM

My dear friends in Christ,

With this "Synod on Synodality", Pope Francis is calling all of us, the entire People of God, to journey together! This is a journey of encounter, of listening and discerning with the whole Church. It is about listening deeply and allowing all voices to be heard, especially those on the margins. This is what it means to be the Body of Christ.

The term, "synod" is unfamiliar to many of us, and can be confusing. The word derives from an ancient Greek term that means "coming together" or "traveling together." Simply put, as Pope Francis has described, "a synodal Church is a Church which listens." Let us not be intimidated by the language, but focused on walking together, speaking boldly, listening deeply, and holding the tension that exists when we ourselves may not have answers or consolation.

This is a completely unique and unprecedented opportunity, because on this journey, no one is to be left behind or excluded. Unlike past synods, this is not simply a discussion for the hierarchy, or for those on the inside - Pope Francis is calling all of us to express our faith, our hopes, and our dreams for the Church.


During Lent, we will prepare our hearts and minds for the journey, and for the difficult task of holding the stories of joy and sorrow surrounding how the Church journeys together. We invite you to dive deeply into the preparation, and into Francis' vision of synodality, by participating in our upcoming community-read of Pope Francis' latest book, "Let Us Dream: The Path to a Better Future."

In the Easter Season, our Collaborative will offer many ways to engage in the work of the synod, including listening sessions and other opportunities to allow all of us to share our own stories and listen deeply to each other. By June our Synod Committee will share the fruits of that listening with the Diocese and the Secretariat for the Synod of Bishops. We must understand, though, that this is not a synod with a simple beginning, middle, and end; instead, we are called to continue to gather the fruits of what the Holy Spirit is saying to us, and to put synodality into practice from now on.

What is the synod on synodality?



Wait, there's a synod happening? What exactly is a synod?

A synod is a gathering, traditionally of bishops, that helps the Church to walk forward together in the same direction. The word "synod" comes from the Greek syn-hodos, meaning "the same way" or "the same path." Synods were common in the first centuries of Christianity, giving bishops the opportunities to meet and discuss issues of importance for the life of the Church. In recent decades, synods have been organized every two or three years, bringing together bishops, experts, and various delegates to discuss topics like the Eucharist, the Word of God, the Middle East, the new evangelization, the family, young people, and the Amazon. In each case, bishops vote on a Final Document, then the pope writes his own text - called an "apostolic exhortation" – to **open new** pathways and shed new light on what was discussed at the synod, so that it

can radiate across the entire Church.

What's unique about this synod on synodality?

Unlike past synods, this one isn't about addressing a particular issue. This synod is totally unprecedented, for at least three reasons.

- 1. It is no longer only a **one-month Synod** of *Bishops* but a two-year synodal process for the entire People of God, all the baptized! All are invited and no one is to be left behind or excluded!
- 2. It is a synod that aims on giving the entire Church a *lived experience* of synodality. It's not just about filling in a questionnaire, but gathering the fruits of what the Holy Spirit is saying to us here and now.
- 3. The aim of the synod is not just to talk *about* synodality, but to put synodality into practice from now onwards, in every diocese, parish, and country across the whole world. This calls all of us, at every level of the Church, to renew our way of being and working together moving forward.

So why a synod on synodality?

Of course, synodality is difficult to pronounce but it is even more challenging to put it into practice. The whole process is about helping the whole Church to walk forward together, united in the mission we share. This begins by paying attention to those who are often forgotten, excluded, or not listened to - hearing what God has to say to us through those we may ignore. The path to a Church that listens and walks together starts with you and me... this synod does not end!



So what is synodality anyways?

Fundamentally, synodality is about *journeying together*. This happens through listening to one another in order to hear what God is saying to all of us. It is realizing that the Holy Spirit can speak through anyone to help us walk forward together on our journey as the People of God. The point is not that we take two years to understand some new buzzword that will soon fade. Synodality is no passing phase! Rather, "walking together" is at the heart of what the Church is all about, as the People of God on pilgrimage in the midst of the world. In the days of the early Church, Saint John Chrysostom said that for him "Church" and "synod" were synonyms, since the Church is all about walking together. In this sense, synodality is a way of renewing the Church from her deepest roots, in order to be more united with one another and better carry out our mission in the world. Concretely, being "synodal" is a way of being and a way of working that takes a more grassroots, collaborative approach, taking time to discern the path forward together. It highlights the fact that we all have something precious to contribute to the Body of Christ. In this way, a "synodal Church" is a Church that listens: "It is a mutual listening in which everyone has something to learn. The lay faithful, the bishops, the pope: all listening to each other, and all listening to the Holy Spirit, the "Spirit of truth" (In 14:17), in order to know what He is saying to the Church" (Pope Francis, Commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the institution of the Synod of Bishops, October 17, 2015).

WALKING TOGETHER CORNER

While Synods are as old as the Church herself, this Synod on Synodality is unprecedented in so many ways. Our challenge as Catholics is to actively resist the temptation to see this Synod as something similar to anything we've experienced in our lifetimes. There are significant signs that this is a consultation of the entire people of God like no other and truly a step toward fulfillment of the work of the Second Vatican Council.

One of those signs is in the appointment of Sister Nathalie Becquart as Undersecretary of the General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops, making her the first woman to have the right to vote in the Catholic Synod of Bishops.

Pope Francis has made significant attempts to reform the hierarchical structures that have defined the Roman Catholic Church for centuries — structures that have in many ways limited the influence of lay people and especially women. Few have had such a decisive say on shaping the future of the institution as Sr. Nathalie.

Sr. Nathalie is a French Religious of the Congregation of Xavières. In May of 2019, she was appointed by Pope Francis, along with four other women and one man, as Consultor to the General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops in the Catholic Church. She played a significant role in both the Synod dedicated to Young People in the Synod on the Pan-Amazonian region.

She sees the appointment as Undersecretary (No. 2 Officer at this Synod!) as a part of Pope Francis' effort "to implement synodality at every level of the Church's life and to benefit from the important contribution that women can make." She also comments that her appointment points to a move to disconnect the exercise of leadership from ordination.

In the Easter Season, as a Collaborative we will engage in the work of the synod through listening sessions and other opportunities to allow each of us to share our stories and listen deeply to each other and the Holy Spirit.

By summer, we will share the fruits of that listening with the Archdiocese of Boston and with the Secretariat for the Synod of Bishops.

AND THEN IT'S OVER?

No! In October of 2023, all the bishops will meet in a formal synod process to engage with the documents from around the world.

OK, SO THEN IT'S OVER?

No! Our synodal journey does not end! Pope Francis is calling us to put synodality – speaking boldly, listening deeply, and including all – into practice in our parishes and in our Church *from now on!*
